Course description:

The main goal of the course is to help students write unified, coherent paragraphs/essays containing sophisticated transitions in both words and ideas. Students are expected to be able to use various types of writing, including narrative, descriptive, expository essays, in elaborating their ideas. Students are also expected to be able to use effective definition, description, illustration, classification, comparison, and causal relationship in their writing. More advanced rhetorical skills such as parallelism, repetition of key words, etc. will also be focused.

Instruction:

The instruction of this course will focus mainly on class activities including

- 1. discussion of assigned readings,
- 2. practice on various writing processes and strategies, such as brainstorming, outlining and paraphrasing
- 3. peer review of essays written by classmates, and
- 4. in-class writing—This is usually done immediately after the discussion of the readings and is done within a time limit.

Students' regular attendance and full participation are required and **NO EXCUSES OF ANY KIND FOR ABSENCE WILL BE ACCEPTED.** Absence from class is pardoned only for irresistible causes (e.g., hospitalization) on condition that all assignments are done.

Assignment:

Reading assignment: Students should finish the assigned readings (on the syllabus) before class and share their views on the readings with the rest of the class in class discussion time. **Pop quizzes will be given in the beginning of class if time permits.**

Writing assignment: Students must show that their essays are carefully drafted, revised and edited with "obvious" efforts. The first draft will be reviewed by peers in class. The second and final versions of the essay will be evaluated by the instructor, and handed back to the students with comments. All essays must be typed with an outline.
